

Prefixes

1. Flam- to blaze, fire, or burn

Ex: inflame, flamboyant, flamingo

Additional words: inflammable, flame

Seeing his ex-girlfriend holding hands with his best friend *inflamed* him with jealousy.

The man was *inflamed* with anger when he saw that the man who had murdered his wife was not going to jail and had won the case.

Her *flamboyant* attitude did not impress the store manager, who ended up firing her.

The boy's *flamboyant* and outgoing personality attracted her.

The large, pink *flamingo* waded in the water at the San Diego Zoo.

Her cheeks were a shade of *flamingo* after seeing the boy who she liked smile at her.

The mother removed the *inflammable* material from her child's hands.

The arsonist poured *inflammable* liquid all around the house before lighting up a match.

The beautiful \$1.4 million mansion was engulfed in *flames*.

I light up the candle and watched the glowing *flame*.

2. For- away, opposite

Ex: forbear, forgot, forgo

Additional words: forbade, forsake

Lisa said it was difficult to *forbear* from smoking after doing it for 30 years.

Timmy *forbore* his decision to close the store, deciding to wait until after the Christmas season.

She *forgot* to bring an umbrella and was soaked in the rain.

Due to the car accident, he lost his memory and even *forgot* who he was.

Due to lack of sleep, she had to *forgo* her math homework.

We had to *forgo* the trip to the beach due to the rain.

Her parents *forbade* her from going on internet chat rooms.

We *forbade* Mona from dating Stephen.

Gerard *forsook* his career of optometry and became a model.

The parents urged their daughter to *forsake* her career as an actress and return to their home to become a doctor.

3. Form- to shape, fashion

Ex: formal, formula, format

Additional words: uniform, formation

The prom queen looked radiant in her elegant, *formal* dress.

He wrote a *formal* letter to the President.
The students in Chemistry memorized many *formulas*.
Everyone failed the *formula* quiz.
The student forgot to put his essay into MLA *format* and was deducted points.
He *formatted* his work space so it could be neat and tidy.
He wore his brand-new *uniform* proudly.
His *uniform* was dirty and torn from the war.
We looked up at the cloud *formations* in the sky.
As dancers, we have certain *formations* in certain dances.

4. Far- to go on a journey

Ex: fare, warfare, wayfarer

Additional words: safari, faraway

The *fare* for the Smith's 2 week vacation in Maui was \$16,000.

The man decided to leave his home and go on a *fare*.

The women cried as they learned that their loved ones died as a result of the *warfare*.

Warfare and peace are not synonyms.

In The Odyssey, Odysseus was a *wayfarer* who drifted the seas in search of his home.

The *wayfaring* stranger walked and explored new lands.

The tourists on the *safari* eagerly searched for lions.

In Africa, we went on a *safari*.

She held her hand to her heart as she thought of her husband who was in a *faraway* land.

5. Fer- to carry or bear

Ex: ferry, infer, offer

Additional words: refer, fertile

The *ferry* carried Kerry to Staten Island.

We waited for the *ferry* to take us to America.

Sitting in traffic at 1:05 P.M., he *inferred* that he would be late for his 1:30 P.M. meeting.

We *inferred* that the weather would be warm today.

Seeing that his girlfriend struggled to carry all of her books and binders, he *offered* to carry them for her.

We refused the *offer* to buy a reclining chair.

The E.R. doctor *referred* the patient to a gastroenterologist.

We *referred* the McTireds to take a vacation in Seychelles.

The rich, luscious soil was *fertile* in nutrients.

The land in South America is *fertile* and produces many crops.

6. Em- in, on

Ex: embattled, embody, embrace

Additional words: emphysema, embalm

We *embattled* by saddling the horses and stringing our bows.

Because we had *embattled* better than our foes, we won the war.

We will *embody* the water into a glass.

The squishy surface of the snail was *embodied* safely into its hard shell.

As the sun sank slowly out of view, a sailor *embraced* his wife because he would be gone for two years.

As we look onto the wrestling match, we see one person *embracing* the other in a full on headlock.

To get rid of his *emphysema*, he was given a series of medication.

Emphysema is caused by a collection of pus in a body cavity.

The mummy was *embalmed* to preserve his body in the next life.

Embalming was a common practice in ancient Egypt.

7. Ent- to be

Ex: entity, absent, present

Additional words: represent, abridgment

The *entity* of hope is faith.

Her overall *entity* was tranquility.

The student was marked *absent* because he was not in his seat when the bell rang.

Because the singer was *absent* from her show, the date was changed to the following Thursday.

When the teacher called Sally's name, she politely responded by saying, "*present*."

John was *present* when the game began earlier, even though most his team was not.

The protesters were *representing* the movement for women's voting rights.

Susan's mother *represents* exactly what I imagine a mother to be.

The *abridgment* of Great Expectations is half of the original size of the book.

The school day was *abridged* because of labor day.

8. Es- out of, away

Ex: escape, escort, espresso

Additional words: esophagus, estrogen

To *escape* the rain, we ran under the balcony.

The firefighter was able to *escape* the burning house before it collapsed.

Oprah's *escort* was able to pull her away from the raging fans.

For Clare's senior prom, her parents got a limo to *escort* her and her date to the building.

An *espresso* is made by forcing live steam out of the coffee bean.

My favorite type of coffee is *espresso* because of the rich flavor.

The *esophagus* leads chewed up food to the stomach.

When Jimmy had his *esophagus* injured, he wasn't able to eat for two weeks.
A hormone in females is *estrogen*.
Estrogen helps women increase their emotions.

9. Ev- age, eternity

Ex: medieval, primeval, longevity
Additional words: evolve, forever
Medieval warriors often wore armor and rode horses.
Back in *medieval* times, toilet paper was non-existent.
Primeval plants were very simple plants.
Primeval humans were more resembling to monkeys.
Sea turtles are known for their *longevity*.
Longevity is the ability to live for a long time.
Over millions of years, humans *evolved* from monkeys.
Evolution means change over time.
It took *forever*, but we were finally able to buy a dog.
Some people say the universe goes on *forever* in every direction.

10. Ed- to hear, listen

Ex: obedient, obedience, disobedience
Additional words: education, edema
The dog was *obedient* and sat when he was told to.
Obedient children are more respected when they get older.
Obedience is the key to potty training your child.
Obedience means to do what ever you are told to do.
Disobedient children often got whipped forty years ago.
The *disobedient* puppy was put in his crate for the rest of the day.
His *education* got him his scholarship.
Even though some people complain about getting an *education*, it will benefit them further on in their life.
When Susan was pregnant, her ankles swelled up because of *edema*.
Edema occurs when the ankles swell up during pregnancy.

11. Deci- tenth

Ex: decibel, decimal, decimate
Additional words: decile, deciliters
His voice recorded to be 45 *decibels* of sound, which is no louder than the hum of an air-conditioner.
I was thrilled to discover that I could hear several *decibels* more than average for my age group.

If you move the *decimal* to the right, the number increases; if you move it to the left, it decreases.

When multiplying, be careful to put the *decimal* in the correct place – it makes all the difference.

A single disease or pest could easily *decimate* the crop of an entire country.

Intense air attacks fixed and *decimated* the Iraqi army.

Only those falling into the top *decile* were selected for mailing.

12. Det- to divide

Ex: despot, geodesy, geodetic

Additional words: detach, determine

It is true that the bishop was not an absolute *despot*.

Charlotte always arranges everything in our house and rules us like a *despot*.

The data products are stored in a central databank and made available online to the space *geodesy* and geodynamics community.

The publication has chapters that address key issues in *geodesy* such as geodetic surveying techniques, geodetic systems, physical geodesy and satellite geodesy.

The authority also maintains an accurate *geodetic* network, compliant with European standards, as the main reference of its cartographic products.

For high-precision applications the mean *geodetic* latitude should be corrected for polar motion.

The astronaut *detached* the tether from himself and the tools.

The boy was *determined* to win over the girl's heart and tried everything to impress her.

13. Dol- dull

Ex: dolt, doldrums, doltish

Additional words: adolescence, doleful

If you hadn't been such a *dolt*, we wouldn't be sitting in detention right now.

August is a time of *doldrums* for many enterprises.

Stop being in the *doldrums* and cheer up!

That was an extremely *doltish* move; why did you call the girl ugly in front of her boyfriend?

Many people who carry out *doltish* actions end up with suitable consequences.
Starting early is the best way for parents to prepare for their child's *adolescence*.
Promoting good health in childhood and young *adolescence* could prevent unintentional injuries.

The *doleful* man approached the coffin of his father; he was mournful and expressed great sorrow.

The little league team looked *dolefully* out the window at the rain, knowing that the game would be cancelled.

14. Dorm- to sleep

Ex: dormant, dormitory, dormouse

Additional words: nondormant, dormer

The *dormant* volcano worried everyone because it was showing vague signs of activity; it could erupt at any moment.

The dog remained *dormant*, refusing to budge even when its owner stepped on its tail by accident.

In colleges, students often remain in a *dormitory* so they don't have to travel from school to home every day.

Living in a *dormitory* is very different from living in your own personal room at home.

He reminds me of a little *dormouse*, the way he curls up, with his little feet all tucked up.

The hazel *dormouse* peeked out of its tiny hole, twitching its nose as it sniffed for danger.

Ex: council, counsel, countenance

Additional words: county, counting

Her best friend *counseled* her on what to do on her first date.

He cannot *countenance* living in the community.

In my opinion, Orange *County* is the best place to live in Southern California.

In first grade, the students first started learning *counting* numbers.

17. Counter- against, opposite

Ex: counteract, counterargument, counterpunch

Additional words: counterfeit, counterattack

18. Crea- flesh, bring forth, to grow, to believe

Ex: create, creature, increase

Additional words: creak, crease

Everything that he touched was *created* into his many masterpieces.

There was a *creature* living in the woods, down by the river.

The child hid and cowered in his bed; hoping that the *creature* in his closet would not get him while he was sleeping.

There was an *increase* in the gas prices because of the poor economy.

Her test grade *increased* her grade dramatically.

Every *creak* in the night made her wince.

The burglar moved surreptitiously throughout the house without making a *creak*.

She made a *crease* in her book when she left it in her backpack.

His face *creased* into a beautiful smile.

19. Cut- skin

Ex: cuticle, cutaneous, subcutaneous

Additional words: cutback, cutis

At the nail salon, they push back their *cuticles* before painting the nails.

Did you know that your *cuticles* are just dead skin at the base of your nails?

There is such an illness called *cutaneous* leishmaniasis.

Cutaneous anthrax occurs when a bacteria touches a cut on the skin.

Vets know how to give your pet a *subcutaneous* injection.

Fungi can live *subcutaneously* in your toes.

The doctor told her patient to *cutback* on the cigarette packs, or even just to quit smoking.

The district had to *cutback* on spending.

The *cutis* is a layer of skin beneath the epidermis.

20. Dam- loss, hurt

Ex: damage, damnable, damnation

Additional words: damp, damask

She had done many *damnable* things that she regrets in the past two days.

Her behavior was so damnable that she was sent to jail for it.

Many people believe that *damnation* comes to everyone once in awhile.

After 30 minutes she showered, her hair was a tad bit *damp*.

The *damp* and moist conditions were great for bacterial growth.

The material of the curtain was an elegant, silver *damask*.

She spilled tomato sauce on the *damask*.

21. Fun- rope

Ex: funambulist, funiculus, funicular

Additional words: fundamental, infundibulum

The *funambulist* trainer helped her to practice the art of tightrope walking.

The key to be a successful *funambulist* is being perfect at balancing yourself.

In certain insects, the portion of the antenna between the basal segments and the club is also known as the *funiculus*.

A lateral *funiculus* is a longitudinal division on each side of the spinal cord comprising white matter between the dorsal and ventral roots.

Early *funiculars* use two parallel straight tracks, with separate station platforms for each vehicle.

A *funicular* uses the technology of an elevator and the technology of a railroad.

The interns were going to master the *fundamentals* of being a teacher.

The *infundibulum* can be the space in the right ventricle at the base of the pulmonary artery.

This news caused headlines in much of the world, and it also provoked *furor* in many countries.

After running, I was *furibundal* due to thirst.

23. Fract, Frag, Frain- to break

Ex: fracture, diffract, refrain

Additional words: fragile, infraction

There were other *fractures* of the femur, which did not give signs of shortening.

Last year, I had a slight ankle *fracture*.

A lens can recombine the *diffracted* light to generate a magnified image of the mask.

The *diffract*ion of the sunlight through the haze created a halo.

Guests are asked to *refrain* from smoking in the bedrooms.

I was not convinced because he gave a *fragile* excuse.
Being so *fragile* emotionally, she got depressed easily.

24. Front- face, forehead

Ex: frontier, affront, confront

Additional words: forefront, frontage

Cheating on a test is an *affront* to your intelligence.

I was ready to be at the *forefront* of any struggle that lies ahead.

The big news was titled in the *forefront* of today's newspaper.

Houses with the lake *frontages* are extremely expensive.

Ex: future, futuristic, futurology

Additional words: futurologist, futurable

With all this advanced technology, you can easily imagine the *futuristic* world.
